lbany County Public Library is excited to announce that it is now a fine free library!

THE

The public library has eliminated overdue fees on all items. Previously, there were no overdue fees on books or children's materials, but other items such as DVDs, video games, and board games did have overdue fines.

While it is eliminating overdue fines, fees for lost or damaged items and shipping costs for inter-library loans will not change. Printing costs will also remain the same.

ACPL decided to make this change because of the positive impact it will have on the community. The library wants to have as many Albany County residents and visitors use the library as possible. Overdue fines can block access to members of the community, so this change will help lower barriers and increase access. The change also follows national trends, and will help reduce staff time checking patrons out.

Collecting fees has not been a significant source of revenue for ACPL. Income from

overdue fees falls into the library's operating revenue area of the budget. This area is already a small portion of the overall budget, and overdue fees were the smallest share of operating revenue.

To celebrate ACPL going fine free, the ACPL Board of Directors is doing a onetime fine forgiveness on all past library bills before Feb. 1, 2021. This means that if you have outstanding fines on your library card account, these fees will be waived and your account will be reset to \$0. ACPL recognizes that 2020 was a hard and complicated year and many in our community are struggling. The library hopes fine forgiveness will help.

It is also important to ACPL that former patrons return to use the library. In the past, a patron may have had their library card blocked when the patron reached \$25 in fines. Often these patrons do not return to use the library.

With fine forgiveness, all ACPL library cardholders will be able to start 2021 with a clean slate and can look forward to no more overdue fines.

mini-grant program

Library Foundation provides funding for projects

he Albany County Public Library Foundation debuted its new support program for the public library in September 2018. The ACPLF minigrant program was designed to provide additional funding to the library for needed purposes, while also providing professional development opportunities to library staff.

This newsletter will highlight a mini-grant project completed in the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

ACPL partnered with local nonprofit, Relative Theatrics, to host a virtual viewing and discussion of AND THE WIND HOWLS. The play is a modernday story to celebrate 150 years of women's suffrage in Wyoming and promote the importance of voting and civic engagement.

During the event, participants met on Zoom to watch the play. The play was filmed on a local front porch to maintain social distancing. Following the screening, Susan Simpson moderated a discussion about the play and civic engagement between panelists and the audience. Panelists for the event were: playwright, Leean Kim Torske and members of the development team, Anne Mason and Jared Mohr-Leiva.

AND THE WIND HOWLS was commissioned by Relative Theatrics and the Wyoming Arts Council.

In FY20, the ACPL Foundation provided more than \$5,000 for mini-grants. In FY21, the ACPL Foundation has about \$1,400 for mini-grants. While this is lower than in the last two years, the ACPL Foundation is excited to see what projects can still be accomplished.

ACPL acquired a used bookmobile in February!

he public library was presented with a unique opportunity to buy a used bookmobile from Natrona County Public Library in January. The sale price was an exceptional deal at \$30,000.

"I am thrilled about this opportunity, because this opens up a whole new world of possibilities for library services in our community," Library Director, Rachel Crocker, said.

A bookmobile is a vehicle designed for use as a mobile library. Several libraries around the state have them, but due to the high purchase cost, ACPL did not. A new bookmobile can cost around \$300,000.

Overall, the cost of purchasing and preparing the bookmobile for use at ACPL is over \$60,000. To manage this large cost, the library submitted a grant to the Albany County Recreation Board. This grant application included the purchase cost, a new wrap (the design on the bus), checkout items for the vehicle, bookmobile technology, and Internet access.

ACPL will hear whether this grant is approved in the spring. While waiting on grant funding, the ACPL Foundation provided the \$30,000 upfront cost to purchase the used bookmobile before it was sold to another entity.

The bookmobile is the size of a large bus, as shown in the photos. It can hold thousands of materials for patrons to checkout and has room for computer terminals. The bookmobile has a small programming space as well. Once it is ready for public use, patrons can use the bookmobile just as they would the main branch of the library.

More outreach and better access have always been



goals at ACPL. The bookmobile makes these goals more attainable. ACPL intends to increase its outreach services and library access with the bookmobile. Primarily, the library hopes to use the bookmobile as a West Laramie branch. While the main Laramie branch of ACPL is fairly centrally located in Laramie, it can be difficult for West Laramie residents to visit the library. A mobile West Laramie branch would allow ACPL to better serve individuals and families with greater convenience.

"We really want the library to be a place where people feel safe and comfortable coming, but it is equally important that ACPL goes out in the community," Crocker said. "The bookmobile will let us reach people that aren't able to come to us and provide more opportunities for the public."





The The ACPL staff is already brainstorming the ample ways the bookmobile can be used. The bookmobile may be used at outreach events such as the Farmer's Market, or parked at locations where the library is providing programming. It will also serve as a great marketing tool for the library.

While ACPL has obtained the bookmobile, it will take several months to complete the project and develop a schedule. Figuring out the best way to staff the bookmobile will also be an important task for the library staff to work on.
