ACPL spearheads early development coalition

ast year, Albany County Public Library received a \$115,000 grant from Albany County Government ARPA Recovery funds to form an early develop-

ment coalition. The Albany County Early Development (ACED) coalition's goal is to build a group of organizations to collectively support ages 0-5 and their caregivers.

A C P L playing a central role in the coalition is a natural fit, as

literacy is integral to early childhood development. So far, the coalition has about 15 partners on board that meet monthly to discuss how best ACED can serve the community.

The coalition has come together quickly because of the in-

> terest and great need in Albany County. large focus of the coalition is on low-income families and families that are atrisk or need more help with early childhood development.

A C E D gives the partners an opportunity to

spread the work, connect with one another, and share resources.

YOUNG **WRITERS PROGRAM**

FOL PROVIDES BIG DONATION **UPCOMING EVENTS**

FOL **BOOK SALE** ACPL is functioning as the primary organization, as the group begins to work on a series of pop-up events and building a resource website.

The coalition will host a pop-up from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. on April 1 at the Laramie Plains Civic Center Kenny Sailors Gym. The pop-up is in celebration of the Week of the Young Child, a week to celebrate early learning, young children, and their support system. Participants are encouraged to come learn more about the coalition and engage in playtime.

The ACED website will include helpful information and resources that provide easy access to community-wide services for children ages 0-5 and their families. For example, the website will have information on vaccinations and how to enroll in kindergarten, as well as tips on good places to play.

At the library, partnerships are bringing more opportunity to programs for the 0–5 age group and their caregivers. At Book Babies, a lactation specialist is present every other week to support new parents, and WIC will be in attendance to answer questions and give information about helpful resources. ACPL will also be starting a 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program to encourage reading long before children head to school.

Programming Highlight: ACPL's Young Writers Program

Writers Program in late 2022 for youth of all ages. The Young Writers Program was a series of weekly events that invited youth to participate in local author-led workshops and creative writing.

Local authors covered different topics each week. Participants learned more about research, editing, different types of writing, character development, and writing tips from the authors. For example, local

author, Melodie Edwards, read an excerpt from her Young Adult book to work with the students on developing animals into characters. Another author, Jason Clark, provided students with examples of his creative writing notebooks and described how music can play a role in poetry and different prose.

Thirty-one youth in Albany County registered to participate, and each week the program saw around 25 participants. Twelve of these students participated in all five workshops. The students were highly engaged, asked thoughtful questions, and immersed themselves in the writing project each week.

After each author workshop, participants spent an hour of individual creative writing time. Following all the workshops, students were invited to submit a writing sample to a contest judged by the participating authors.

The judges were highly impressed with the variety of writing submitted. There was sci-fi, poetry, and even a picture book submission. Many of the first lines in the writing samples were powerful.

The contest selected 5 winners:

- "Stone and Pine Needle" by Theo
- "Back to the Dinosaurs" by Roma
- "In My Next Life, I Want to Come Back as a Butterfly" by Erin
- "The Cat vs. the Baby" by Lilla
- "The Neon Lazers: Protectors of the Universe" by Xander

Winners were provided with a certificate to a Young Writer's Camp with Lighthouse Writers Workshop. Special thanks to Lighthouse Writers Workshop for donating these certificates!

The programming series was based on the Young Writers Program, as part of National Novel Writing Month. Due to the popularity of the program, ACPL is planning on hosting another workshop series in the future. The program had great engagement and offered a different activity for students in the community.

The Young Writers Program was a partnership with the Wyoming Humanities Council. The ACPL Foundation received a \$5,000 grant from America Rescue Plan funds to provide programming.

Friends of the Library provides BIG

he Friends of the Library provided \$58,230 to the Albany County Public Library in 2022. This is a major accomplishment, as the 2022 donation amount is a return to pre-pandemic contribution levels. Funding from the Friends of the Library is predominantly used by ACPL to continue to grow the library's collection of books and other items.

The Friends of the Library raise funds from memberships, book sales, online sales, and the Book Nook. In 2022, funds also included a \$7,500 grant from the Wyoming Humanities Council!

Memberships are a simple way to provide extra support to the Friends of the Library. Memberships can be purchased anytime during the year, and are valid for one year. You can also purchase a membership at the door when coming to attend a book sale.

Membership Levels:

- \$10 for an individual membership
- \$15 for a family membership
- *\$50 for a benefactor membership

Attend a Book Sale!

In 2022, the Friends of the Library made \$19,990.69 from book sales. Friends of the Library members are given shopping priority and may enter the sale before public hours begin. Sales are held in the basement of Albany County Public Library.

The book sale has an incredible offering of books from every genre. Books are neatly sorted and priced to allow for easy shopping. There is a large assortment of children's books, as well as specialty books, such as: cookbooks, classics, foreign language, and more. Sales also encompass more than physical books. Shoppers can find audiobooks, music (CD & LP), and movies/TV shows (DVD and BluRay).

Shop Anytime Online!

The Friends of the Library Amazon storefront has over 1,400 materials available for sale. You can shop online at: friends.acplwy.org/shop. Items sold online are ones that would benefit from a larger sales audience and are priced to be more in line with the high quality, rarity, and interest of the item.

In 2022, the Friends of the Library generated \$18,494.02 from online sales.



Shop for a Book in the Nook!

The Book Nook is a great option for shopping anytime the library is open. The Friends of the Library Book Nook is located right inside the library's front doors. The space includes a selection of popular books from different genres, as well as many children's books, music, and movies.

The Book Nook is another area that generates significant income for the Friends of the Library. In 2022, this area made \$8,690.25.

What Happens To Your Donations?

The Friends of the Library rely heavily on donations of gently used items from the community. When you donate to the Friends of the Library, your items go on to a great new life and support your public library.

Donations are first considered for the ACPL collection. After this determination, items are moved downstairs to the Friends of the Library area where volunteers sort, label, price, and shelve materials. Materials

are sorted based on where each will be sold, whether it is at a book sale, online, or in the Book Nook.

Recently, the Friends of the Library received a donation of about 10,000 DVDs. These large donations rely on the dedicated work of many volunteers to prepare them for sales or to be sold online. If you're a big DVD fan, make sure to stop by the next sale to see the collection!

Donations are accepted anytime the library is open. Accepted items are: books, audiobooks, CDs, LPs, DVDs, and Blu-Ray discs. Items that are not accepted are: VHS tapes, magazines, and yard sale items. If you have collectible magazines you're interested in donating, contact FOL_booksale@acplwy.org. To make a large donation, contact the Friends of the Library to make arrangements.

Donations since December 2022 have been down. Consider going through your personal collection to see if you have any items to donate. The Friends of the Library can provide you with a tax-deductible receipt for your donation.

Community Involvement:

Not every item is appropriate to sell, so the Friends of the Library have an extensive outreach system to provide free books across our community and beyond. When enough books are available, the Friends of the Library provide materials for over 30 locations. Free books have even made their way to groups who took them as far as Kenya and Brazil. Want to Volunteer?

The Friends of the Library run entirely on volunteers. As a 501c3 nonprofit organization, the organization is overseen by a board of directors, but it has no staff. The volunteer-run organization has about 60 volunteers.


