he Friends of the Library established another opportunity to make books and other items available to the public with the creation of the Book Nook in 2010.

The Book Nook allows the Friends of the Library to offer products to the public yearround, where previously community members had to wait for one of the three book sales each year to purchase items from the Friends of the Library. The Book Nook also increases public awareness about what the Friends of the Library do.

The Friends of the Library encourage you to shop the Book Nook anytime you stop by

the library. The Book Nook is located right inside the front doors.

The Book Nook has the latest titles and is focused more on popular authors and items that are in the best condition, Bernie Horst, a Friends of the Library book sale volunteer, said.

Horst oversees the Book Nook, consistently rotating books on the shelves and filling empty spots throughout the week. There is always something new to purchase in the Book Nook.

The Book Nook mainly exists to sell continued on page 2

books, but it also includes family-oriented CDs and DVDs. The books sold in the Book Nook are from 14 different genres, Horst said. The children's books are the most popular sellers.

In the Book Nook, hardcovers normally sell for \$2-\$3 and recently published paperbacks normally sell for \$1. Items purchased in the Book Nook make great gifts and are reasonably priced, Horst said.

All funds raised from the Book Nook go to the library to purchase new materials for the collection. In a typical calendar year, the Book Nook sells more than \$4,000 worth of materials, increasing the funding that the library uses for new materials.

Besides the strong financial support the Friends of the Library provide to the Albany County Public Library, the organization also finds new homes for the donated books and other items. The Friends of the Library save many books from being recycled by providing free books to more than 25 locations around the community.

## Curl up with a good book

he Albany County Public Library's first annual Winter Reading Challenge for teens and adults kicked off in early January.

"Winter seems like a better time for adults to participate in a reading challenge," Megan Richardson, adult services librarian said.

Often summer can be an overly busy time for adults, leaving little time to participate in the library's annual summer reading

program, Richardson said. It can be difficult for parents to participate in the summer with their children, so Richardson and Young Adult Specialist, Kennedy Penn-O'Toole created the Winter Reads! program with these busy adults in mind.

The Winter Reading Challenge is for teens and adults. To participate, simply pick up a

reading log at the library or print out a reading log online at: http://www.albanycountylibrary.org/1adults. aspx. Participants have until March 31 to complete the challenge. The reading log lists several prompts for the types of book the teen or adult may read. The participant must read or listen to four books, audiobooks, or ebooks for a chance to win prizes.

Richardson's favorite prompt is "Read a book you own, but haven't read."

"Everyone has a book sitting on their shelf that they haven't yet read," Richardson said. "Especially


Participants can only count a book toward one prompt on the reading log.

Prizes for the program include mugs, pint glasses and reusable bags. Each time a participant completes four books, he or she is entered into a weekly and grand prize drawing. The grand prize is a Kindle.

Participants can earn extra

entries into the drawings for each book posted that tags ACPL on Facebook, Twitter or Instagram or uses the hashtag #ACPLWinterReads!

## **Relabeling over 100,000 library items**

he Albany County Public Library is working on a project that will make positive changes to library usability.

Since 2015, ACPL has undertaken a relabeling project for the library's collection. Before books or other items head to the shelves, staff prep them to add theft protection and to make it easier for patrons to find the item they are looking for. This involves inserting security tags, adding an item record to the library catalog, securing dustcovers on hardcover books, protecting paperback spines with tape, and adding barcodes and property stamps.



Another important part of this process is preparing an item label that allows patrons and staff to find it in the library. This label shows a call number.

Over the years, call numbers on new library items have been updated for user-friendliness. Yet the library has never had the time or enough personnel to fix the call numbers on the labels of older items.

You may have noticed this problem when you're searching the shelves for a specific book. Often a book sitting on the shelf will have a call number sequence that doesn't match the call number sequence of the books next to it.

Due to this confusion, a relabeling project for all items was essential.

Spearheading this project is Ada Grabowski, a copy cataloger who has been with ACPL off-and-on


since 1995. Grabowski can recall times the library had at least five different methods for call numbers on items in the collection.

Since 2015, Grabowski – with support from the library's Technical Services staff – has devoted time to fix item labels. She has made significant progress having completed item labels in the following sections: adult fiction, science fiction, and romance; young adult non-fiction, fiction, books on CD, and Manga; adult and young adult graphic novels; juvenile graphic novels; and music CDs.


The relabeling project involves updating the spine label on each book, the inside label on the cover of each book and the record in the library catalog. Non-fiction spine label call number will follow the Dewey Decimal System, which has existed in the U.S. since 1876. Fiction spine label call numbers will name the author, as they are organized alphabetically by author's last name.

Call numbers will also clearly state which section of the library the item belongs in. For example, a young adult book call number will start with YA, whereas a children's book will start with JUV.

The inside labels on the covers of the books have also received an update. Besides the information provided on the spine label, the inside label will show if





the book is part of a series and what number the book is in that series.

In the months to come, Grabowski will continue to work section-by-section in the library until all items have been relabeled.

The relabeling project will make the borrowing process easier for both patrons and staff. Patrons will find that library items are easier to locate, while it will be simpler for staff and volunteers to shelve items in the correct location. Patrons will notice that library item records in the catalog are more uniform, and the borrowing process will be more streamlined. **(**)
