Learning to code at the library

ttendees at a special program in December at the Albany County Public Library learned a new way to play Rock, Paper, Scissors.

ACPL, in partnership with TechTalk Laramie and the ACPL Foundation, hosted a Learn to Code event for ages 8 to 118 to celebrate Computer Science Education Week and Hour of Code. No coding experience was needed to participate.

Local programmers from TechTalk Laramie taught the hands-on coding class. The ACPL Foundation provided laptops for participants to use for the event. The program had three classes based on age, 8-12; 13-17; and 18-118.

Each class did the same coding task, which the instructors then geared toward the age group. The coding task used JavaScript, a programming language, to program a simple game of Rock, Paper, Scissors.

All the age groups enjoyed it, and each class was full. Due to a limited amount of computers, the library had to cap attendance.

"It was interesting because the youngest age group didn't know certain keyboarding tricks," Monica Owens, the library's youth services librarian, said. "But the teens blew through it."

Owens is encouraged by the opportunity to partner with TechTalk Laramie more in the future. There was obvious interest in the coding classes, and there is a big need for more basic computer training for all ages, Owens said.

Owens explained that basic coding helps people to understand basic logic, as well as learning how computers work. Coding and STEM activities are becoming big topics in school and are of interest to most education levels.

Moving forward, the library and Tech-Talk Laramie will work to collaborate on more programs related to technology. Contact the library with your suggestions related to technology programming. 👩

The Winter Reading Challenge is back!

he second annual Winter Reading Challenge kicked off on January 1, 2018. The challenge for adults and teens will run from January to March 31.

Adult Services Librarian, Megan Richardson said last year's participants really liked the program.

"It encourages people to read more widely," Richardson said. "It can help people find things to read that are outside their comfort zone."

This year, there are 40 different reading challenges for participants to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the ACPL Foundation and Friends of the Library.

Reading challenges include: a book purchased from a library book sale, a book about refugees or immigration, and a book becoming a movie in 2018. Each participant can choose which challenges he or she wants to do. Participants can do as many or as few challenges as they choose.

For each four books a participant reads, he or she will be entered into a weekly

drawing. Weekly prizes for the program include mugs, pint glasses, and reusable tote bags.

For each four books read, the participant will also be entered into the grand prize raffle. This year's prize basket includes: an "Alice in Wonderland" tote, library due date socks, a banned books mug, a composition-themed notebook pouch, an Out of Print gift card, a Night Heron gift card, a 1-year membership to the Friends of the Library and two complimentary tickets to the ACPL Foundation's upcoming mystery night fundraiser in the fall.

Participants may only count a book toward one reading challenge.

Participants can earn extra entries into the drawings for each book posted that tags ACPL on Facebook, Twitter or Instagram or uses the hashtag #AC-PLWinterReads!


40th anniversary of the ACPL Four

n 1978, the library's two support organizations, the ACPL Foundation and Friends of the Library, were founded. This was a time of great need for the public library. During the late 70s, the two organizations worked tirelessly to help make a new library a reality. The ACPL Foundation and Friends of the Library hosted fundraisers, educated the public about voting for the new library, and creatively raised money. With the help of these non-profits, the Albany County Public Library opened the doors to the new library in 1981.

In 2018, the library's two support organizations turn 40 years old. Yet, the ultimate goal for the ACPL Foundation and the Friends of the Library hasn't changed after four decades. These organizations still work tirelessly to make a great library even better.

The ACPL Foundation started humbly with only a few thousand dollars in the bank. Today, the library foundation's assets have grown to more than \$2 million. The ACPL Foundation provides a minimum of \$60,000 to the library each year for programming, materials, technology, continuing education, supplies, public relations, building maintenance, and special projects.

The Friends of the Library took over the book sale when it was still at the old Carnegie library. Once the new library was built, it wasn't long before the Friends of the Library book sale grew to the size of a small bookstore in the library basement. Today, the Friends of the Library still runs entirely on volunteers, providing around \$50,000 annually to the public library for materials.








(Below) The annual Friends of the Library book sale in 1980.


