ump onboard for the Albany County Public Library's upcoming Summer Reading Program!

The free Summer Reading Program, for children and teens, will run June 1-July 31. This year's SRP theme is "All Aboard! Celebrating Laramie's 150th Anniversary."

"There are so many exciting things happening during the summer for the 150th anniversary," Monica Owens, the library's youth services librarian, said. "We felt that the library should hop onboard and help bring attention to this important year for Laramie."

In addition to the Summer Reading Program, the library will offer "150 Things for Kids

Around Laramie," a special activity log for kids. These 150 things will given parents and caregivers fun ideas for kids, including visiting local museums or playing in Undine Park's splash park. The activity log starts this summer and runs through December.

Similar to previous summers, the library will have a weekly children's event at 2 p.m. on Tuesdays. Themes for these events will include trains, homesteading, the Wild West, and bingo. Tuesday events are geared

toward school-aged children, but all youth are welcome.

Head to the library on June 5 for Mr. Bones and his walking dinosaur presentation. On June 26, the library will host Jim Jackson's Big Bubble Circus, a comedy/ magic event with lots of bubbles!


> On July 3, families and children are invited to participate in a small parade to celebrate the Fourth of July. Attendees can decorate bikes, scooters, strollers, and more with festive American décor. The last Tuesday event, on July 31, will be an interactive Harry Potter movie experience for all ages and families.

At the Pajama Storytime program on June

28, the library will be participating in Laramie Pridefest with a Drag Queen Edition storytime.

The annual End of Summer Reading Bash will be from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on July 27.

The Summer Reading Program plays an important role during the summer for children and teens, Owens said. Research has shown that reading programs help youth retain their school-year learning over the



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summer. Owens noted that the program also shows kids what a fun activity reading is.

This year, ACPL will debut a reading log for ages birth to three. This log will include early literacy activities.

"A lot of people don't think about the Summer Reading Program for babies," Owens said. "But these are some of the most important years for children to hear vocabulary, learn to turn pages, and fall in love with books. This leads them to becoming lifelong readers, learners and library lovers."

Reading logs and "150 Things For Kids Around Laramie" activity books will be available at the library on June 1. A full schedule of Summer Reading events is available on the library website. ⁽⁾

FY19 library budget process

CPL is approaching the end of its fiscal year, which means it's budget season.

The library budgeting process is a collaborative effort between library administration and the ACPL Board of Directors. The new fiscal year for the library begins July 1, 2018.

Library Director Ruth Troyanek starts the budgeting process by looking at current year spending and communicating with library staff and the board for needs and priorities. Assistant Library Director Rachel Crocker then builds the proposed numbers into a fiscal year budget.

The proposed budget goes through different drafts with the library board before being submitted to the Albany County Commissioners. Crocker noted that the library board gave initial approval on the proposed budget at a meeting in April. The board will hold a public hearing on the proposed budget in June.

The library administration presented the library budget to the Albany County Commissioners in mid-May. The final decision on Albany County's contribution to the library budget comes in June or early in July, Troyanek said.

In order for the Albany County Public Library to operate effectively, it relies on a variety of income sources. In FY19, the library will have a total budget of a little more than \$1 million. The income sources for the library's budget are incredibly important for the library to be able to provide essential services and programs to the community.

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The greatest portion of income for the library comes from the Albany County mill levy. Funding for the mill levy comes from Albany County property taxes. This funding covers personnel costs and some operational expenses, Troyanek said.

One big positive for the library's upcoming fiscal year is that it is fully staffed for the first time since September 2016 and has been able to hire existing part-time staff members for full-time positions in the library, Crocker said.

Another income source is from the Albany County portion of the 5th Cent Sales & Use Tax. The 5th cent tax is levied upon retail sales and consumption of tangible personal property. Albany County voters must renew this tax every four years.

This income source is designated for IT services and purchases. If approved by the Albany County Commissioners, this area will represent \$37,000 of the FY19 budget.

The library also receives 5th cent sales tax funding through the City of Laramie Community Partnership grant. This year, Community Partnership funding, \$12,089, is designated for a portion of library materials and building maintenance expenses.

The public library is dependent on tax monies, Troyanek said. The library would be very challenged if upcoming sales tax elections did not pass.

The Albany County Public Library Foundation will provide a minimum of \$60,000 to the library's *continued on page 7*



ver the last four months, ACPL has welcomed three "new" staff members to the team. Be sure to welcome Rachel Crocker, Cassandra Hunter and Elizabeth Palmer.



Rachel Crocker

Assistant Library Director Rachel Crocker joined the staff on Jan. 31.

Crocker grew up in Wyoming and wanted to move back to the state following a job in Washington. D.C. She was interested in the assistant library director position because it was an opportunity to do operation-based duties in a library setting. Crocker enjoys making things work and working in a place where the staff really care about what they do.

Libraries are an essential part of a community, Crocker said. Public libraries are important public spaces, up there with hospitals and schools.

Crocker has been focused on learning the logistics of working with a governmental institution and educating herself on the library budget with its various fundraising sources and spending priorities.

Crocker graduated with a Bachelor's degree from UW and a Master's degree from Denver University. She formerly worked for Kansas State University teaching library instruction classes, doing community outreach, and conducting reference on the Information Desk. Most recently, Crocker worked at IREX where she was working on the Beyond Access Initiative. She helped public libraries in eight countries add computers and Internet and taught the library staff and public to use that technology. Cassandra Hunter became the adult services librarian at the end of April. Hunter has worked at ACPL for more than four years as a circulation assistant and an adult services specialist.



Elizabeth Palmer


The new youth services specialist is also a familiar face. Elizabeth Palmer has worked as an ACPL circulation assistant for the past two years and started in her new role in April.

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budget. The library's entire all ages programming budget is provided by the ACPL Foundation. This funding is also used for materials, technology, building maintenance, library supplies, and continuing education.

From the Friends of the Library, funding accounts for about 75 percent of the library's total book budget. In FY18, the Friends of the Library had a record breaking year and provided about \$52,000 to the library. In FY19, \$45,000 is projected in the budget.

In FY19, the library is considering allocating a portion of the materials budget to e-books, e-audiobooks, digital videos/music, and online New York Times access.

Lastly, a small portion of the library's income, \$16,000, comes from operating revenue including library fines and copier/printer fees.
