America's Best Loved Books

he Albany County Public Library kicked off The Great American Read with a showing of the first episode in collaboration with PBS in June. ACPL's kickoff event had more than 60 people in attendance. The Great American Read is an eight-part PBS series that explores the power of reading through America's 100 best-loved novels. The other seven parts of the

series will be televised through October.

The 100 novels were selected through a national survey. The series will feature documentary segments featuring appearances by celebrities, athletes, experts, authors and everyday Americans advocating for their favorite book, culminating with a finale that reveals America's bestloved novel as chosen by the American public.

Patrons voted for their favorite novel online, by hash tag on Twitter and Instagram, or by calling or texting. The conclusion of The Great American Read will announce what book from the 100 novels is America's favorite. You can view the list of books at: www. pbs.org/the-great-american-read/home/.

Adult Services Librarian, Cassandra Hunter, is voting for "The Clan of the Cave Bear" by Jean M. Auel. Her favorite book of

all time made the top 100 list.

More than 220 public libraries applied for a \$2,000 grant for The Great American Read through the American Library Association. These grants support public programs around the series. ACPL was selected as one of 50 libraries nationwide to participate in The Great American Read. It was the sole library in Wyoming to receive the grant.

Throughout The Great American Read, the public library has seen genuine interest from the community. The library has collaborated with local book clubs to facilitate discussion about books on the list of 100 novels.

One theme for the books highlighted in The Great American Read is "What We Do For Love." ACPL partnered with local non-

profit, Safe Project, to host a "What Does Love Look Like" presentation for YAK!, the library's teen group.

Youth Services Specialist, Elizabeth Palmer, said the event was valuable and the teens asked great questions. The teens were engaged with the heaviness of the topics covered, as well as understanding how pop culture intersects and plays out in real life with these topics.

In the fall, Adult Services Specialist, Tyler Brown, hosted The Great American Read film fest. The library hosted eight films based on novels on the list, such as "The Great Gatsby" and "Grapes of Wrath." The films were well attended. About a third of the attendees were new faces to the library.

Starting in September, the library debuted The Great American Read trivia series. The first night had 25 attendees. The trivia night covered themes such as: Great Beginnings, Reading Rainbow, and Lesser Known Sequels. Mark your calendars for the next trivia night on November 16.

Other upcoming events for The Great American Read will include a costume ball for children in the spring. Laramie residents will get the chance to pick Laramie's favorite book from the list of 100 during next year's adult Summer Reading Program.



electronic resources

OverDrive: Access to contact 24/7

n August, Albany County Public Library debuted new access to OverDrive, an ebook, audiobook, and streaming video/music resource. ACPL patrons can borrow a wide variety of content simply by using a library card.


To use OverDrive, patrons need to use the Wyoming Virtual Library, located at virtuallibrary.overdrive.com, or download the recently introduced Libby app. Each user will need to enter their county library, a library card number, and their pin to access the service.

OverDrive, the largest provider of electronic content to libraries across the nation, allows patrons to access electronic content 24/7. After downloading the materials while connected to the Internet, patrons can access the content anywhere from a computer or device.

Through OverDrive patrons can have the ease of a no-worry checkout, Monica Owens, youth services librarian, said. The checkout period is 14 days. After the borrowing period, the item will check back in automatically.

Patrons can use multiple library cards for different family members or library cards from different libraries. Each user can check out 10 items and have 20 holds through the app.

Library Director Ruth Troyanek noted that Libby is a very user-friendly app available for library electronic content. OverDrive is

up-to-date nationwide with the most current items.

One feature of the app highlighted by Owens is the readalong feature on certain children's books. The feature highlights the words as children read along.

OverDrive joins ACPL's other ebook and audiobook services, cloudLibrary and RBdigital. One benefit of OverDrive is the access to more titles than other electronic resources. OverDrive has 15,000 available titles. The bulk of these titles are ebooks. The service also has audiobooks, educational videos, movies, and documentaries.

Troyanek felt that pursuing

OverDrive was long overdue for ACPL. Statistics show that patrons at ACPL continue to increase their usage of electronic resources, such as ebooks and eaudiobooks.

Before investing in Over-Drive, the library solely had access to electronic content through the statewide WYLD consortium. While this was a benefit to ACPL patrons, the services provided through WYLD do come with a few cons, such as not being Kindle-friendly.

OverDrive is a service outside the WYLD consortium. Eleven libraries in the state are using OverDrive. ACPL is on a two-year contract with OverDrive for a cost of \$4,000.

OverDrive has excellent tech help and tutorials for new users. Patrons are also welcome to bring in a computer or device to the library to learn how to use OverDrive.

On the Libby app, you can:

- Personalize checkouts by user
- Access sample features of a book
- Put things in categories
- Speed up the narration
- Use dyslexic font
- Easily find "no wait" titles to check out immediately
- Place holds on items
- Easily locate teen or kids books and find specific reading levels

Donate Books @ the Library

- The Friends of the Library, a separate, non-profit organization, accepts donations when the library is open. The donation area is near the library's print station.
- You can donate: books in all genres, DVDs, CDs, vinyl LPs, art prints, magazines (3 months and younger), and nearly new encyclopedias. You cannot donate: VHS, magazines older than three months, games, puzzles, or miscellaneous "yard sale" items.
- The Friends of the Library can provide you with a tax-deductible receipt for your in-kind donation of books and other materials.

Recycle!

- Not every book received is appropriate to sell. Some need to head to recycling. The Friends of the Library make sure these books are recycled properly by taking them to the University of Wyoming recycling center.
- Recycled books with scannable bar codes are then sent on to Better World Books, an organization that takes unwanted books and gets them to people who need them. Learn more at: betterworldbooks.com.

Free Books Across the Community

- The Friends of the Library provide free books across Albany County and beyond.
- Free books from the Friends of the Library make their way to between 15-20 locations in Laramie and to other communities. Free books have made their way to groups who took them as far away as Kenya and Brazil.

Not every book is purchased from the Friends of the Library. Check out the great things the organization does with free books and books that head to recycling.

Paying It Forward

- In 2017, the Friends of the Library worked diligently to be able to donate \$52,050 to the public library for materials. This means new items on the shelves at the library.


