ACPL closure due to COVID-19

he Albany County Public Library has been closed to the public since mid-March, to align with State of Wyoming recommendations. The library made the difficult decision to close on March 16 to keep the community safe and to protect those in the community that are most susceptible to COVID-19.

During the extended closure, the library has staff available 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday-Friday to answer questions via phone, email, and on Facebook. ACPL has a wide array of online resources available for use at digital.acplwy.org.

ACPL requests that patrons hold on to their checkout materials while the library is closed. The library is not accepting donations while closed.

During this unprecedented and longterm closure, ACPL has been fortunate to keep all staff fully employed and working. The library highly values its staff and is grateful it has not been confronted with difficult staffing decisions.

To keep staff healthy and safe, ACPL has transitioned staff to work from home. Library staff members are keeping busy with continuing education opportunities, large-scale projects, and preparing for upcoming programs. Staff are also working to support fellow community members who are stay-

ing, working, and educating at home by curating staff pick lists of free online education and entertainment resources.

At this time, ACPL is unsure of when it will be able to reopen. The library will follow Gov. Mark Gordon's closure orders, which calls for the closure of public place

through at least April 30. ACPL administration continues to collaborate

with Albany County and the

City of Laramie and will monitor recommendations from the Center for Disease Control.

Library staff are working on a plan to best assist the community upon reopening. Once reopen, the library will continue to maintain social distancing around the building, increase cleaning of high traffic

areas, and encourage patrons to use the self-checkouts. All programs scheduled for May have been cancelled.

Your friendly library staff misses you! We will be excited to see our Albany County community and will do our best to serve you and your family once we reopen.

Editor's note: The Summer Reading Quest is contingent upon the status of COVID-19 and the library's ability to be open to the public.


magine Your Story, the 2020 Summer Quest will run May 29-August 25. The library is excited to offer a longer program spanning the whole summer.

This year, ACPL is expanding the traditional summer reading program to include diverse summer learning activities. The Summer Quest will add hands-on, learning based activities to the incentive program to encourage experimentation, collaboration, and family interaction. The program will be offer more flexibility for participants, while encouraging reading and other learning.

The learning incentive part of the Summer Quest will run from the last day of school to the first day of school. The majority of programming over the summer will be on a virtual platform.

This year's theme, Imagine Your Story, encompasses fairy tales, mythology, and folklore. The library will offer four "choose your own adventure" learning logs for the different age groups of infant, kids, teens, and adults. Participants of any age are welcome to read or listen to any book that interests





Adults who participate will be entered into a drawing for a prize basket. Prize basket themes are: Lord of the Rings, Outlander, and I Love Libraries! For kids, the popular necklace and bead prizes are back! Kids will receive a prize bag once they finish the adventure log. For teens, the main prize this year are books.

To maintain social distancing and address COVID-19, ACPL will be monitoring its ability to host in-person





programs, but the majority of programs will be offered through a virtual platform. The library will not be offering large scale programs that draw big crowds, such as performers. ACPL plans to create a YouTube channel to offer craft tutorials, storytimes, and other activities that are suited to an online environment. The library plans to participate in the Downtown Laramie Farmers Market. ACPL will sponsor the Toy Library, host activities, and offer educational take-home kits for families and kids.

Library foundation funds game board shelving project

he Albany County Public Library Foundation debuted its new support program for the public library in September 2018. The ACPLF minigrant program was designed to provide additional funding to the library for needed purposes, while also providing professional development opportunities to library staff.

This newsletter will highlight one of the minigrant projects completed in the 2019-2020 fiscal year.

Adult Services Specialist, Tyler Brown, worked with the ACPL Foundation on a mini-grant project for game board shelving. The previous shelving for board games was intended for books, making it difficult to properly display and have enough space for the board games.

The new game board shelving has a similar footprint to the old shelving, but it is able to hold up to 300 games in an organized and easy to view manner. The shelving is designed to store board games and the amount of available shelving will allow the board game collection to grow. The new board game shelving is located near the library's new adult books shelves by the large windows in the main area.

Brown started the board game collection in 2015. It was the first selection of board games available for check out at a Wyoming public library. Since that time, ACPL has acquired more than 120 games that patrons may check out. Board games are frequently

checked out.


"Board game play is important because it encourages social interaction," Brown said. "Games teach people how to communicate and interact."

The new board game shelves allow for more circulating games to be out on the shelves at once and will make it easier for patrons to find games.

The ACPL Foundation's Agnes Milstead Fund provided funding

for the mini-grant program. The ACPL Foundation will continue to provide the mini-grant program each year to library projects as funding allows.

In FY20, the ACPL Foundation has \$5,000 for projects. The organization will also support a classic book replacement project and slat wall displays for magazines.


Friends of the Library provide HUGE donation to library

he Friends of the Library provided \$55,100 to the Albany County Public Library in 2019. This is a record donation amount for the organization and a 5 percent disbursement increase from 2018.

Funding from the Friends of the Library is predominantly used by the ACPL to continue to grow the library's collection of books and other items.

Since 2014, the Friends of the Library have provided more than \$40,000 to the library each year. These are incredible donation amounts!

The Friends of the Library raise funds from memberships, book sales, online sales, and the Book Nook. The organization is run entirely by a hard working and dedicated group of volunteers.
